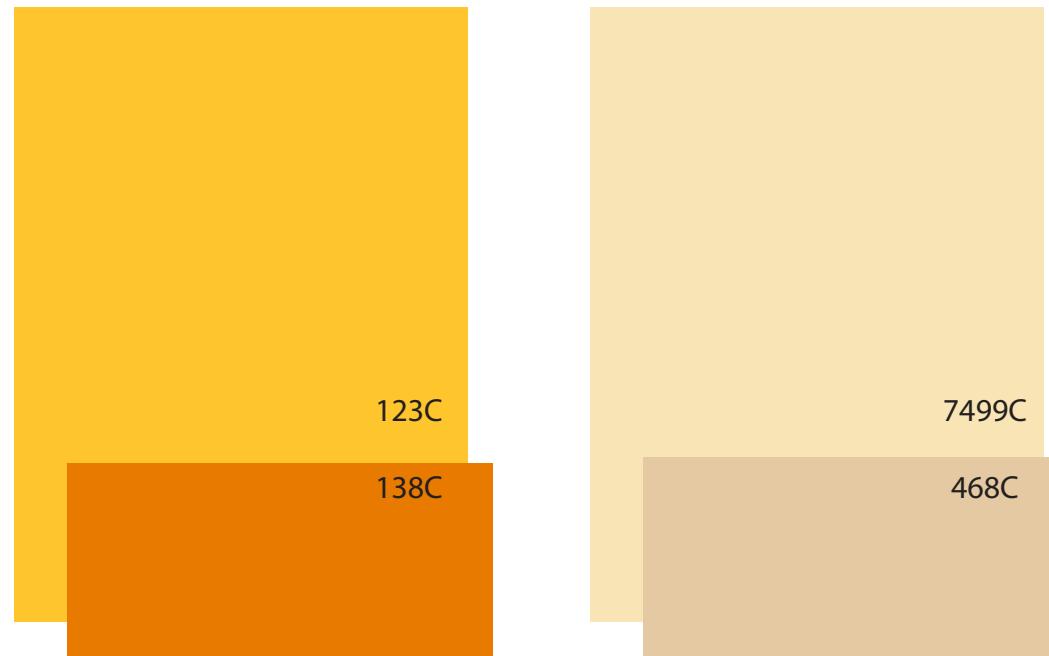
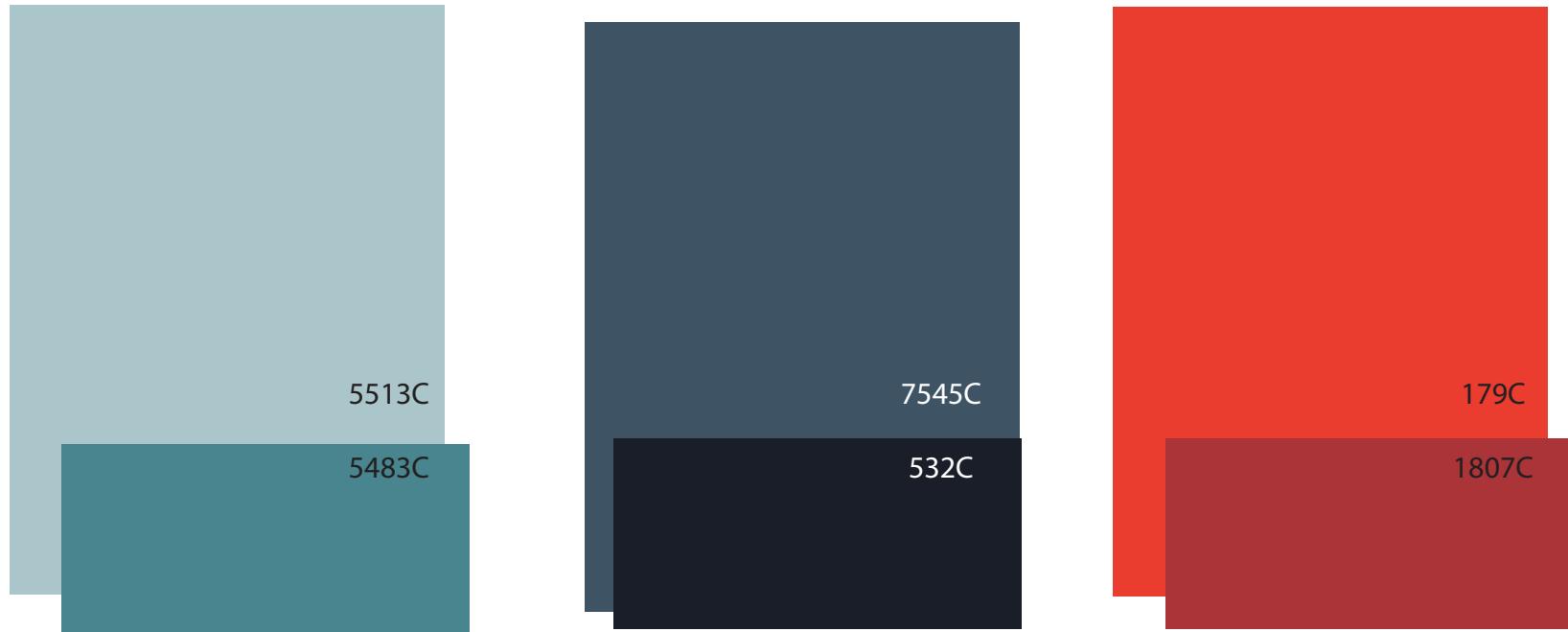

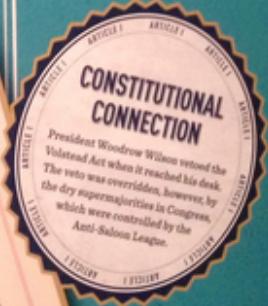
The **VOLSTEAD ACT**

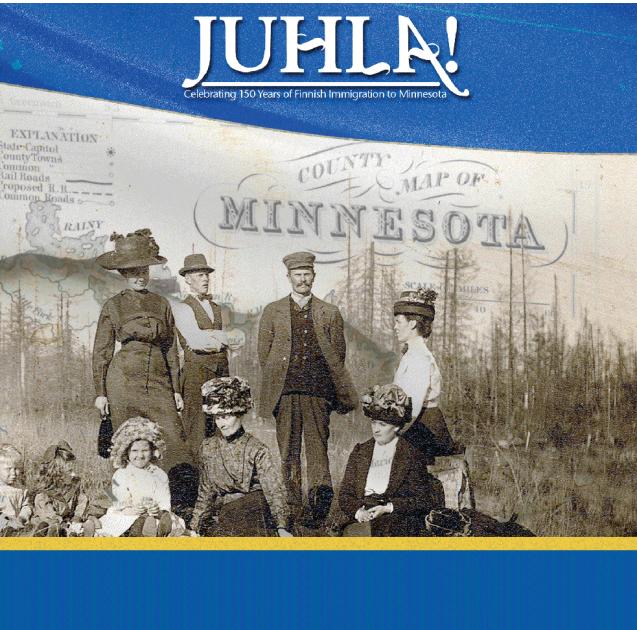
In a spare 112 words, the 18th Amendment made the manufacture, sale, and transport of intoxicating liquors illegal. But a law had to be enacted to determine how the amendment would be enforced.

Passed by Congress in 1919, the Volstead Act stipulated what precisely was illegal and what was not. It managed, in its 67 separate sections, to make the Constitution's new words effective.

INTOXICATING *liquor*

The most important part of the Volstead Act was a definition. It declared that "intoxicating liquor" was anything that was at least one-half of one percent alcohol. This surprised many people who believed that beer and wine would still be legal, including some politicians who supported the amendment.

THE STRAY SHOPPING CART: AN ILLUSTRATED SYSTEM OF IDENTIFICATION

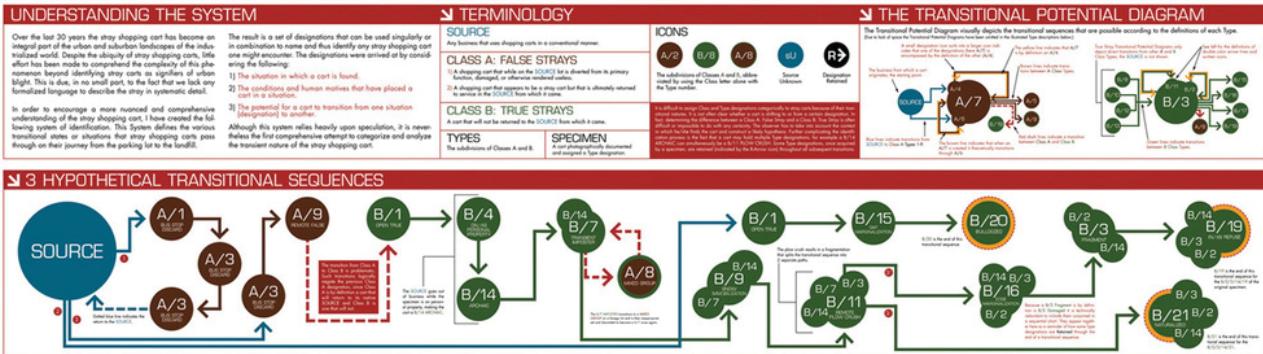
UNDERSTANDING THE SYSTEM

Over the last 30 years the stray shopping cart has become an integral part of the urban and suburban landscapes of the industrialized world. The task of identifying and tracking this urban artifact has been made to comprehend the complexity of this phenomenon by identifying stray carts as signifiers of urban blight. The goal of this system is to create a language to identify and formalized language to describe the stray in systematic detail.

In order to encourage a more nuanced and comprehensive understanding of the stray shopping cart, I have created the following system of identification. The designations were arrived at by considering the following:

- 1) The situation in which a cart is found.
- 2) The conditions and human motives that have placed a cart in a situation.
- 3) The potential for a cart to transition from one situation (SOURCE) to another.

Although this system relies heavily upon speculation, it is nevertheless the first comprehensive attempt to comprehend and analyse the transient nature of the stray shopping cart.
